FireWise Recognizes Positive Action in Mountain Shadows

Three Mountain Shadows residents were recently honored by the Colorado Springs Fire Department's FireWise program. Kathleen Frazier, Dick and Francine Hansen were among the sixty five area residents who were honored for their efforts to reduce the city's wildfire risk at the fifth annual FireWise Champion's recognition event this past October. In total, 375 residential acres of wildfire mitigation was done that improved the survivability of the homes in neighborhoods in Colorado Springs. More than 200 tons of vegetation consisting mostly of dead, dying, or diseased trees and shrubs were removed as a result of these projects. In Mountain Shadows, 42 home owners mitigated 13.86 acres removing 7 tons of material.

Our Mountain Shadows champions are continuing this effort with two planned mitigation days in 2009. (See FireWise Article on page 8.)


What Will the Future Hold for Trailblazer Elementary School?

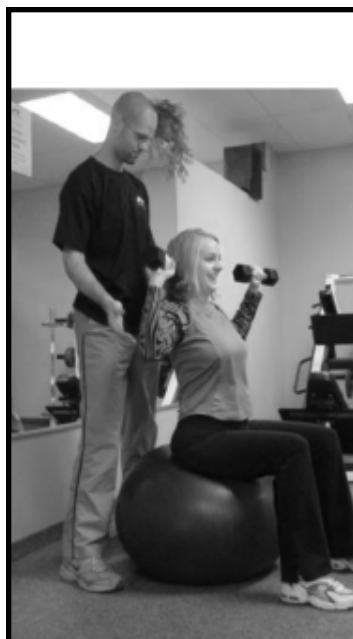

Together We Can Reduce Wildfire Risk You, Your Community Association, and the City Fire Department

All homes in Mountain Shadows are within the city's wildland urban interface (WUI)—an area with significant risk of wildfires. FireWise has evaluated each home in the WUI for its individual wildfire risk. To learn your home's wildfire risk, you can visit the FireWise website at <http://csfd.springs.gov.com>.

If you are looking for motivation to begin your annual FireWise maintenance, consider the recent Sondermann Park fire that burned approximately 18 acres and came within 100 feet of homes. A combination of poor choices, illegal fireworks, dry vegetation, and windy conditions could quickly turn a pleasant day into one of devastation and loss.

Whatever causes you to consider the potential for a wildfire to affect your home or Mountain Shadows; whether it be a wildfire in the news, a desire to reduce your risk, or just wanting to clean up your yard, the City Fire Department's FireWise program is willing to help.

In the near future, the Fire Department will coordinate a volunteer Mountain Shadows wildfire mitigation project. We hope this to be the first of many mitigation projects to address the potential for wildfire in the park areas around your community. Similar to the Sondermann Park fire, homes in Mountain Shadows are surrounded by a combination of native grasses and brush, as well as a variety of evergreen trees. *The potential for a wildfire to the community is great. Your participation in this upcoming event will be critical to modifying the vegetation and therefore decreasing the intensity and behavior of a fire moving through that environment. We hope to announce the date of the mitigation*

project at the annual meeting and details will be in the next newsletter.

Paramount to addressing wildfire risk on the property surrounding Mountain Shadows is addressing the wildfire risk around each home. Making simple changes around your home can mean the difference between a home surviving or being lost in a wildfire. You can call the FireWise office (385-7281) to schedule a no-cost consultation to evaluate the best ways to reduce risk around your home. This is a wonderful opportunity to prioritize your spring landscaping and prepare for the FireWise neighborhood chipping event scheduled for October.

Annual FireWise Checklist

The area around your home needs periodic maintenance similar to your home's interior. Each year trees and shrubs continue to grow, plants die or are damaged, and plants drop

A Word from City Council

At the annual City Fire Department's "Celebration of Life" event, we recognized the Fire Department and those members of our community who were given lifesaving treatment (usually as a result of a heart attack or other serious cardiology-related medical trauma). It is touching to meet those fantastic members of our Fire Department who render emergency treatment, often with minutes or seconds to spare, as well as the individuals whose lives were saved.

One woman featured had gone into cardiac arrest late one afternoon. Fortunately, people with her immediately called 911 and she happened to be only four blocks from Fire Station 3. That station's crew got to her in three minutes. Because they were able to get there quickly, they managed to give her lifesaving actions and make sure she was quickly taken to the hospital for follow-on medical treatment.

In her comments, the woman who was saved thanked the Fire Department and then said something very profound: "I learned later that Station 3 was slated to have been closed a few years ago, as a result of some budget issues. I didn't know that, but I'm really glad that it was decided to keep it open."

The budget crisis that precipitated the proposal to close Station 3 was much less severe than what we are going

through now. But our community leaders (I wasn't on Council then) figured this public safety resource was too valuable to be closed. Fast forward 10 years, and a woman who didn't know about that debate is alive today because people in the community and on Council thought that it was too important to downsize or eliminate.

I've been giving this woman's remarks a lot of thought as we consider what City services to pare back as a result of our current budget crisis. While many things that the City provides are important to our quality of life, nothing is more important than the protection given all of us by our over-worked and under-manned Police and Fire Departments. Whether it's pulling people out of a burning Castle West Apartments fire or apprehending a dangerous murder suspect, our Police and Fire Departments provide the most critical services offered by any local government. And that is why I will continue to resist efforts to further cut our public safety resources and work to ensure that those emergency services we depend on, sometimes in life or death situations, will be there when we need them.

Let's not get into a future situation where you or a loved one needs police or fire protection, and because of budget cutbacks, they get there just a minute or so too late.

Simple Safeguards to Protecting Your Identity—Stopping Identity Theft Before It Stops You

If You Are a Victim

1. Contact any one of the three credit reporting agencies and place a fraud alert on your account.
2. Contact affected financial institutions.
3. Contact affected creditors.

If a Loved One Dies

Send a copy of the death certificate to the three credit reporting agencies.

1. Protect Your Personal Information

- Protect your social security number. Don't provide it unless required and never write it on checks.

- Photocopy the front and back of all the credit cards you carry in your wallet and store the copy in a safe place.
- Never routinely carry your social security card, passport, or birth certificate with you.

2. Protect Your Documents

- Shred your confidential trash with a cross-cut or diamond-cut shredder.
- Don't leave outgoing mail with personal information in your mailbox for pick-up.
- Retrieve mail as soon as possible after delivery and avoid leaving it in your mailbox overnight.

3. Watch Out for Tricks

- Never provide personal information to anyone in response to an unsolicited request.
- Never reply to unsolicited e-mails from unknown senders.

4. Protect Your Communications

- Ensure your computer is protected against viruses and spyware and set to update often.
- If you have wireless internet, make sure it is password protected.
- Make sure your cordless phone is digital and has a frequency of at least 900MHz.

5. Check Your Credit Report

- Order your credit reports at least three times per year (free).
- Check financial accounts often and investigate any unusual activity.

Dear Residents,

Many people think that getting involved in a new "program" will require a huge time commitment but that is not the case with the Neighborhood Watch Program.

We strive to achieve three things with neighborhood watch. First, we hope that neighbors will be in an awareness mindset all the time, and keep an eye out for anything that may be suspicious. This may be the suspicious vehicle, the person that they have never seen before in the neighborhood, that sort of thing. Second, we hope that neighbors within a given area will establish a means of communication with each other in order to alert one another about situations that have occurred. This could be as simple as an e-mail distribution list and phone numbers for neighbors in the event that immediate notification becomes necessary or you just want to let them know that their garage door was accidentally left open. The third thing is to establish communication with the police department. Each neighborhood that has a Neighborhood Watch group will have a Block Captain. That person becomes the point of contact for the police department for any e-mails regarding burglary trends, suspect vehicles of interest to the police, and monthly newsletters. Block Captains distribute any e-mails received from the police department to their group. I then become the point of contact on behalf of the police department for the various neighborhood watch groups formed in the Falcon Division.

I personally believe that neighborhood watch is more important now more than ever. Historically speaking, a downturn in the economy usually means higher crime rates.

Consider the following. Since January 1 of this year to February

22, Rockrimmon (which officially includes Mountain Shadows) has had the following crimes committed:

- 31 Vandalisms
- 42 Car break-ins
- 26 Burglaries
- 5 Cars Stolen

Including the above calls, a total of 1545 calls to the police were made during the same time frame in Rockrimmon. That includes all other types of calls such as noise, disturbances, suspicious vehicles, traffic accidents, etc.

This translates to about 23 calls per day to the police department from the Rockrimmon area.

ICE — In Case of Emergency

We all carry our mobile phones with names and numbers stored in memory but nobody, other than ourselves, knows which of these numbers belong to our closest family or friends.

If we were to be involved in an accident or were taken ill, the people attending us would have our mobile phone but wouldn't know who to call. Yes, there are hundreds of numbers stored but which one is the contact person in case of an emergency? Hence this ICE (In Case of Emergency) Campaign.

The concept of ICE is catching on quickly. It is a method of contact during emergency situations. As cell (mobile) phones are carried by the majority of the population, all you need to do is store the number of a contact person or persons who should be contacted during emergency under the name ICE (In Case of Emergency).

The idea was thought up by a paramedic who found that when he went to the scenes of accidents, there were always mobile phones with patients, but didn't know which number to call. He therefore thought that it would be a good idea if there was a nationally recognized name for this purpose. In an emergency situation, Emergency Service personnel and hospital staff would be able to quickly contact the right person by simply dialing the

number you have stored as ICE.

For more than one contact name simply enter ICE1, ICE2 and ICE3, etc. A great idea that will make a difference!

their leaves and needles. Making your home safe from a wildfire can be as simple as an annual clean-up. Follow these tips to make your home FireWise:

- ✓ Remove dead, dying, or diseased trees and shrubs
- ✓ Trim low branches of evergreen trees
- ✓ Remove highly flammable plants adjacent to the home
- ✓ Remove debris accumulations within your yard
- ✓ Remove branches that hang over roof and chimney
- ✓ Mow grass and weeds to a low height
- ✓ Attach a hose that can reach to all parts of the house
- ✓ Post house numbers that are visible from all directions
- ✓ Discuss evacuation routes and meeting locations
- ✓ Replace wood roofs with a non-combustible roof
- ✓ Consider a fire resistant exterior siding; such as stucco

Disease Prevention Is the Goal for 2009

The word for 2009 is *prevention*—protecting your health through prevention. Your local tax dollars provide 18 percent of budget, a cost to each County resident of \$4.63 per year.

Here's an overview of the protections we offer using your county tax dollars:

Retail food establishment (RFE) inspections: Colorado RFEs serve 2 million meals each day, per the Colorado Restaurant Association. We must inspect 2,700 licensed RFEs, including restaurants, school cafeterias, and hot dog stands. We work to meet the state-required minimum of two detailed, routine inspections of each RFE. In 2009 we hope to offer restaurant inspections online.

Infectious disease tracking, investigation and prevention: So far this year, our Communicable Disease staff members have investi-

gated six disease outbreaks in our county, including three related to food sources. Our "disease detectives" participate with colleagues at the Food and Drug Administration and the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

Emergency Preparedness: There's a public health protection component to any emergency—snowstorms, fires, floods other natural disasters, and epidemics.

Assistance: Through state and federal grants (57% of revenue, to be used only for purposes designated by grantors), we offer babies and children to age 5 and their families supplemental nutrition and education through Women Infants and Children (WIC). Each 2008 month, 14,000 County residents participated in WIC and used \$9 million in food vouchers from Oct. 2007-Sept. 2008, contributing to our economy.

Nearly half of all County infants participate in WIC.

Heart Health: A new state grant aims at improving the health of the entire population by attacking heart and cardiovascular disease. Services

Of the 3,000 local health departments nationwide, only 158 have been so recognized as "Public Health Ready."
